The children made many little sacrifices for the conversion of sinners; the fact is they gave up life as they knew it—for the love of God and humanity—and through it all, they prayed.

We may never know how many lives were changed for the better or how many souls were saved as a result of Fatima, but that is not for us to count. It is far more important that we follow the examples of Lucia, Francisco, and Jacinta—to willingly say yes to God's call. Certainly what they endured for God and humanity was not easy. At times, what they experienced was quite scary, but they were always safe with Mary—let us always remember that.

life does not always go the way we expect it? What do we do when God's plan changes our plans? Are we willing to say yes? Saying yes does not guarantee happiness in this world. The children of Fatima faced great resistance, their lives were threatened, and they were even thrown in jail. In her earthly lifetime, Our Lady dedicated her life to prayer. Mary urges us to pray because Our Lady knows its power and importance in the work of healing, reparation, and redemption. When we pray, we share in that work and in the process, we unite with Jesus Christ. Mary wants us to unite with her Son because only through that saving unity with Jesus Christ will we reach the Kingdom of God.

Even if we are unable to do anything else, we can always pray. The problem is not enough people pray and as a result, so many are unable to witness and experience God's loving mercy. Imagine how much closer our world would be to Heaven if we all prayed. Perhaps we think prayer is like a drop of water in a bucket. What difference does a drop of water make? It's one more drop than what was there before. If each one of us adds a drop every day, the bucket eventually becomes full and overflows.

Let us consider Fatima. When Our Lady first appeared on May 13, 1917, Mary stood before three children. Word of the apparitions spread and by October 13th, roughly 70,000 people witnessed the miracle of the sun in Fatima. Many prayers were offered up and many were answered. Today, a Basilica stands in Fatima and millions have come to pay homage and to pray.

Of course, God answers our prayers in His own time and choosing. An answer may come overnight or it may take months or even years. However, time is never wasted in prayer. If we persevere in our prayers, we solidify and fortify our relationship with God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit; that is the relationship Mary our Blessed Mother wants for each of us.

Truly our world is in need of many prayers to help it through these very challenging, and often, violent times. We do not know what the future holds, but we can certainly do our share to ensure a better, more loving, more forgiving, more compassionate and by far a more peaceful future for ourselves, our loved ones, and our enemies if we devote more time to pray for one another and our world.
